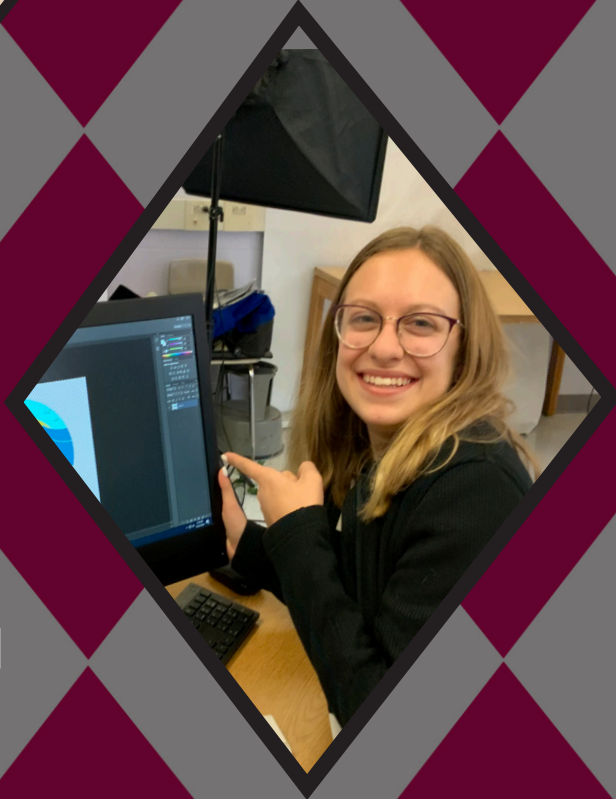
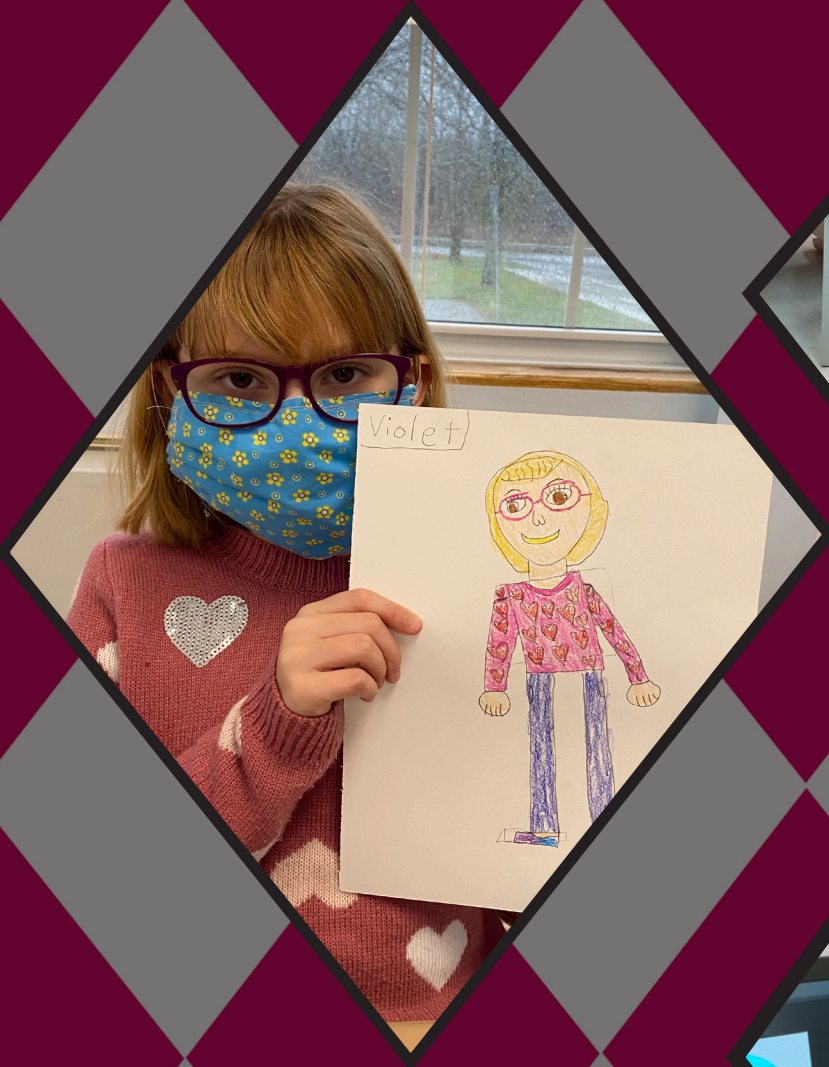

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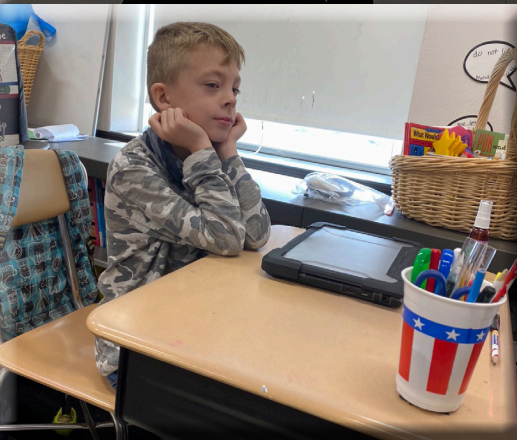
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**GLAD

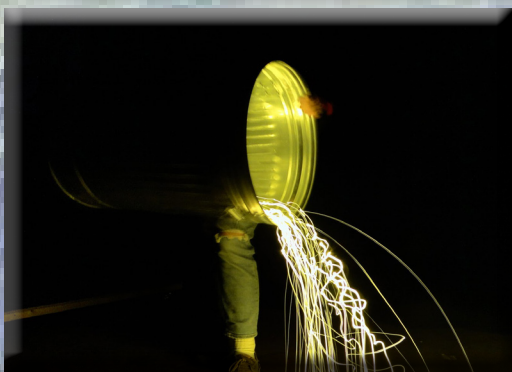

VIRTUAL VISIT WITH JOHN GRAY

On Tuesday, November 24th Argyle elementary students participated in a virtual visit with local news celebrity John Gray. Mrs. Jennifer Bailey, ACS second grade teacher and longtime fan, learned that Gray offered school visits so she contacted the news anchor and requested he come and speak to students in our school. Mrs. Bailey was very excited when she found out that the author agreed to come to Argyle. "I have been a John Gray fan for years", she stated. "I watched him on News 10 and then followed him on Facebook when he started writing stories. He writes a lot!" An in-person assembly was originally planned for last Spring, but had to be rescheduled when the district transitioned to remote learning.

Students in Kindergarten through grade 6 were able to connect with Gray via a Google Meet. Teachers used classroom Smartboards to present the visit and the students were introduced to his four dogs. One dog, Keller, was the focus of the discussion because he inspired Gray to write the children's book titled Keller's Heart.

The picture book tells the story of Keller, an abandoned dog who is both blind and deaf. In the story, a young girl adopts the puppy and a beautiful bond between pet and owner begins. The students were delighted to learn that Keller's book character was based on a real dog and that he was actually adopted by John Gray's family! The author shared that a veterinarian calculated Keller's birthday to fall mid-February and near Valentine's Day (the puppy was abandoned so an exact date is unknown). The white shepherd has a dark patch on its side and, when his hair is cut, this mark resembles a heart. This is why the book was named Keller's Heart. Gray began the Meet by reading the picture book in its entirety to his ACS audience. The newsman responded to many questions asked by students and teachers. He recounted how the appearance of the main character in the book was based on a photo of his wife when she was a little girl. Gray also fielded questions about Keller and his other dogs and how it feels to be an author.

According to Mrs. Bailey, "The kids loved hearing about his pets and were excited about how old they are and what kind of dogs they are. One person asked how it felt to be a published author, to see his work in a store. He told of how he was at Barnes and Noble in Albany and first saw his books displayed, and how awesome and unreal it felt."

Mrs. Bailey and Speech and Language teacher Mrs. Cheryl Simpson coordinated the book sales. Students and teachers were able to purchase autographed copies of Keller's Heart. The \$275 proceeds were donated to the Lucky Puppy Dog Rescue right here in Argyle. Art teacher Mrs. Margaret Bartow designed the book fliers and created a Lucky Puppy t-shirt that was given to John Gray.

"Keller's Heart is a great story for all ages because it teaches us that everyone needs a friend and it's okay to not be the same as everyone else", Mrs. Bailey shared.

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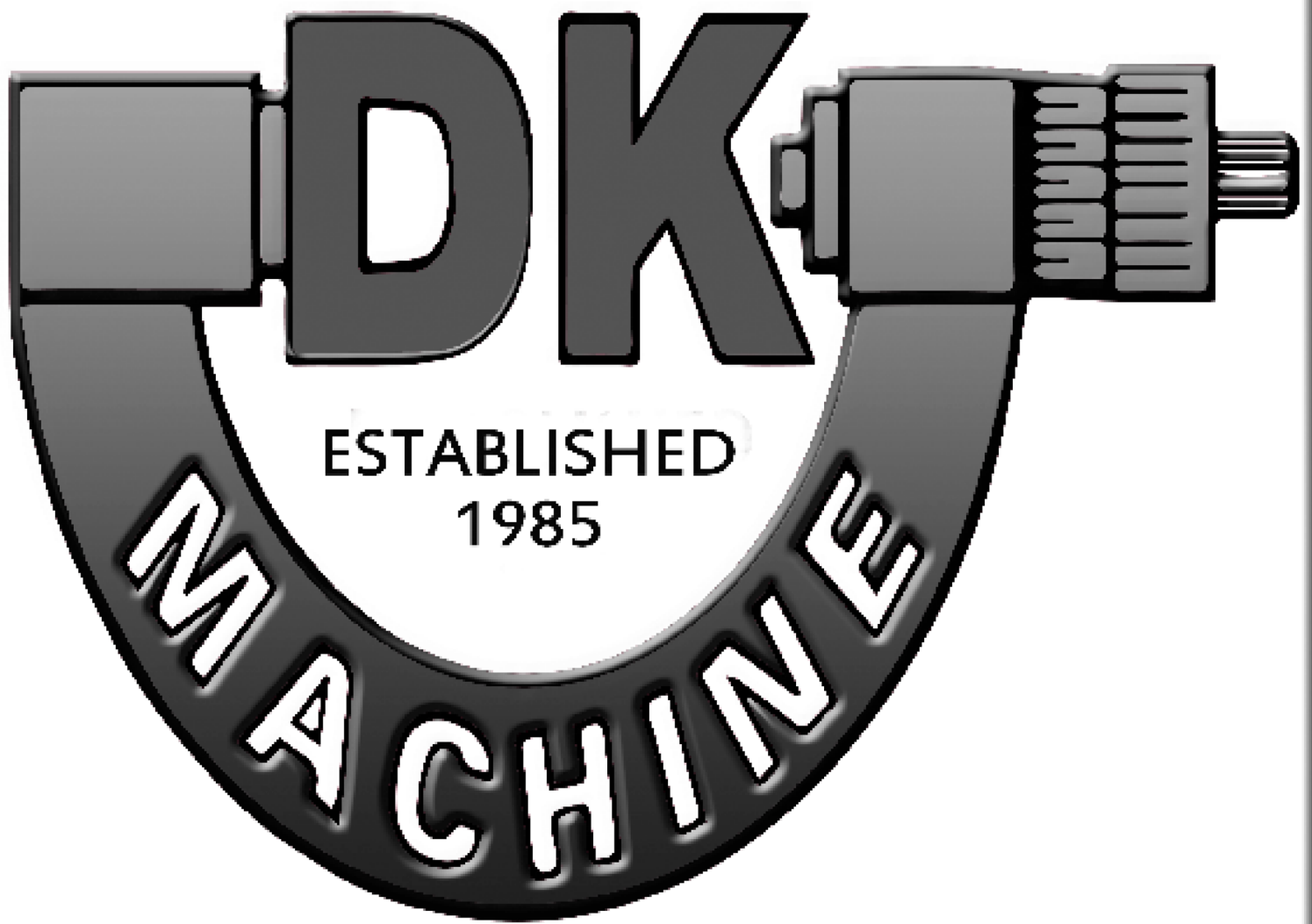


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
